Question Wheel Instruction Sheet

Materials:

- Question Wheel
- Scissors
- Glue Stick
- Brass Brad



Assembly:

1. Cut out both hexagons and the difficulty key.
2. Paste the difficulty key on the back of the larger hexagon.
3. Write your name on the back of the larger hexagon.
4. Using the brad, carefully poke a hole through the center of each hexagon. Stack the smaller hexagon on top of the larger hexagon aligning the centers. Insert the brad, separate and bend back each side to hold the two hexagons together.

How to Use:

The question wheel will help you ask better questions during class discussions and make it easier for you to write strong meaningful questions to ask your literature study group members.

Use the difficulty key on the back to help you determine which color combinations make what type of question.

The question wheel only gives you the question stem. This means you still have to read and come up with the meat of the question. Over time, you'll be able to create and answer all three types of questions even without your wheel.

Once your wheel is fully assembled, put it in a safe place so you'll have it when you need it.
